Scott Galloway has written, directed, and produced more than 800 television programs for networks including ABC, A&E, Cooking Channel, Court TV, DIY, ESPN, Food Network, HGTV, History Channel, INSP, Lifetime, Ovation, public television, Travel Channel and Turner South. He has directed and produced two theatrically released documentaries, "A Man Named Pearl" and "Children of All Ages." Both films have won multiple festival awards and have been screened throughout the world. Galloway has written and directed two documentary films that have been broadcast nationally on public television, including four-time Emmy-nominated "Our Vanishing Americana" and nine-time Telly award-winning "Overdraft." He has been a featured director for the Southern Circuit Tour of Independent Filmmakers and has been chosen as a delegate for the American Documentary Showcase, a U.S. Department of State initiative featuring 30 documentary filmmakers and their films, which are said to represent the best in American documentary filmmaking.



Duane Cooper, Strategic Films



Don Godish, South Carolina ETV



Don Godish has more than forty years of broadcast and filmmaking experience within public television. His credits as producer, director, and executive producer include more than 25 national series or individual programs. As a producer/director, he has filmed in Italy, Germany, Spain, France, Japan, Canada, and throughout most of the United States. While working in West Virginia, he served on the creative team that produced several national programs, including an episode of "American Experience" and two "Firing Line" specials, featuring William F. Buckley Jr.

Godish's work has garnered a National Emmy Award for "Children in America's Schools with Bill Moyers," a regional nomination for Best Director, and Regional Emmy Awards and Telly Awards for many documentaries. His recent national documentary "Sea Change," that examines coastal climate change impacts, achieved a 95 percent rate of carriage. Godish is SCETV's executive producer for "Somewhere South," "Reel South," and "Yoga in Practice." He also served in the same role for the final season of the Emmy Award-winning "A Chef's Life." Godish is SCETV's director of National Content/Regional Operations. His community work involves youth tennis programs and the Special Olympics.
