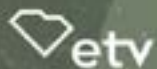

Logo

There are two versions of the *After Action* logo, a black version and a white reverse version to appear on darker backgrounds.

Recreation

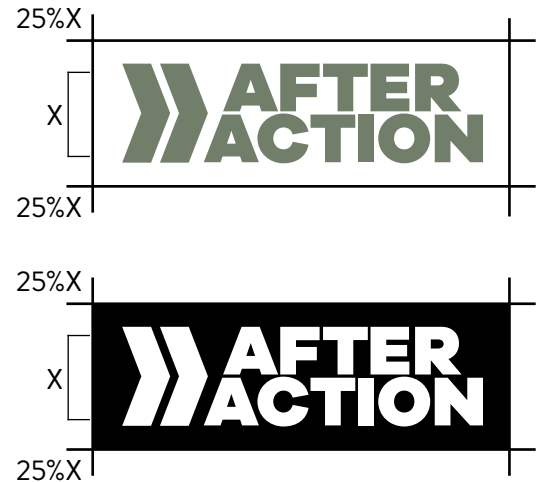
Do not recreate the logotype.

Reverse Logo

When printing onto a dark background without color printing capability, a white version of the logo is approved for use.

Distortion

Do not stretch, distort or otherwise modify the logo. This includes the implementation of decorative effects, such as emboss or drop shadow – all of which are prohibited.



Minimum Padding





Minimum Padding around the logo is equal to 25 percent of the height of the logo.

Minimum Sizing

Logo should never print less than 0.5" in width.

Colors

The primary color palette for *After Action* includes green, grey, brown and black. Green is the brand's primary color and should be used so long as the final product passes color accessibility. CMYK colors are recommended for most print jobs. Brown is the brand's secondary color and should be used as an accent or in locations where green, grey or black are not appropriate.

During three combat tours, she earned the Bronze Star Medal and Air Force Commendation with Valor for combat actions in Iraq. Though combat disabled and retired from military service, Pearsall has not let her disabilities hold her back. With her service animal, America's Vet Dogs Charlie, by her side, she continues to work worldwide as an independent photographer and is an author, educator, military consultant, BRAVO748 public speaker and founder of the Veterans Portrait Project.

Featured Veterans | Episode 1



WILLIAM BROKOP



William “Bill” Brokop Retired from the Air Force after serving 21 years, but not before deploying around the world as a space system and ground radio maintenance operator. While on deployment to Kyrgyzstan, he met fellow Airman, and future wife, Ashley Brokop. Despite being told that he could not have children, Ashley became pregnant. Unfortunately, Bill was deployed shortly after discovering the news, uncertain whether he would witness the birth of their much-anticipated-son, Wesley. Upon requesting an early redeployment, Bill was told, “If they [Air Force] wanted you to have a family, they would have issued you one.” Thankfully Bill did make it home, because just six weeks after Wesley’s birth, his wife Ashley was sent on deployment. Their dual-military marriage with both leapfrogging on deployments and temporary duties became untenable. Ashley left service to manage their growing family, while Bill stayed and continued to deploy, dropping in and out of his family’s life over the years – sacrificing so much in the process. Bill lives with his wife Ashley, daughters Betsy and Abby. His son Wesley has just left home for Air Force basic training.



MARIA GUNTHER



First generation Mexican American, Maria “Coco” Gunther, enlisted in the Air Force at the age of 26 as videographer. She became pregnant with her first child while at her first duty station in Minot, ND. As a single parent, she relied on her military peers and sisters’ support, who all volunteered to care of her child when she was on alert, on temporary duty, and on orders abroad. She eventually met and married fellow Airman, Dwayne Gunther, and together they were stationed overseas. As their family grew and the stressors of balancing the military mission in a dual-military household, Coco contemplated separation from the service. In the end, she decided to stay in the Air Force, and her three children Adrionna, Gloria, and Tony, adapted to the endless base-hopping and military recalls. From combat deployments to field training exercises, Coco always found a way to balance the mission with motherhood. She retired in 2011 as a Senior Master Sergeant and is a fulltime homemaker.



HANNAH MERCHANT



Hannah Merchant joined the Marine Corps shortly after graduating high school in 2014. During her time in service, Hannah enjoyed a successful, meaningful career as a Motor Transportation Operator, where she also met and married fellow Marine, Myles Merchant. They promptly started a family and with both on active duty, it became a challenge on the home front. Hannah juggled motherhood with her commitments to the military, all while her husband went on deployments and training ops. As a Drill Instructor, Myles worked long hours, often leaving Hannah to manage alone. When her daughter was two, Hannah realized she needed to create a stable home environment for their growing family and opted not to re-enlist. She got out of the Marine Corps to focus on her family and education. Since completing her associate and bachelor’s degree, she has worked as the Producer for “After Action” and is now SCETV’s Assistant Director of National Content.

ADDISON
BURGESS, SR.



Reverend, Chaplain, and retired Army Colonel Addison Burgess, Sr., is a native of Lake City, SC. He was ordained as an Itinerant Elder in the 7th Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church in 1991. Thereafter, he received a military commission from South Carolina State University ROTC program in 1992. Upon completing his Master of Divinity (MDiv) Degree in Pastoral Care/Counseling from the Interdenominational Theological Center/Turner Theological Seminary (ITC/TTS) in Atlanta, GA, in 1996, Addison was endorsed by the AME Church and entered active duty as an Army Chaplain in 1997. Over his storied Army career, he deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, was assigned to the Office of the Chief of Chaplains at the Pentagon and served as Installation Chaplain Project Officer at Fort Jackson to name a few. Since retiring from military service, Addison has shifted his focus to the veteran community where he serves as a Veterans Affairs Staff Chaplain.



KHALLID SHABAZZ



Distinguished scholar, military officer and spiritual leader, Chaplain (Colonel) Khallid M. Shabazz, Ph.D., D. Min., currently serves as the first Muslim brigade chaplain in Army history. As a child, Khallid was sexually abused by a family friend an experience that left him an angry young man. When he first went to college, he fell in with the wrong crowd, engaging in violent disagreements, one of which he was beaten and shot in the back. He survived but decided to put his studies on hold and joined the military. Khallid's new identity as a Muslim came in the early 1990's. He faced discrimination from other soldiers and the displeasure of his Christian family. He was ready to quit the military, but then he met with an Army chaplain, who persuaded him not only to stay and become a chaplain. Khallid became a chaplain in 1998, having studied Arabic in Jordan along the way. He also earned two master's degrees at universities in Connecticut and California. Shabazz is just one of five Muslim chaplains in the army. Khallid is now responsible for tens of thousands of soldiers and supervises other chaplains. Like all military chaplains, he serves soldiers of all religions.



JULIE SCHWARTZ



Rabbi Julie S. Schwartz is the Associate Dean of The Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) in Cincinnati, OH. She graduated summa cum laude from Walnut Hills High School and a three-year-graduate of Northwestern University and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in modern history. She was ordained at HUC-JIR in Cincinnati in 1986, before becoming the first woman rabbi to serve on active duty as a chaplain in the United States military. Her active-duty years were spent at the Naval Hospital in Oakland, CA. There she focused on developing her pastoral care skills as well as providing leadership for the Jewish military community of Northern California. Since her military service, she has held various positions at HUC-JIR, pursued advanced training in pastoral care and counseling and in adult education. She is certified as a Jewish chaplain by the National Association of Jewish Chaplains and became a certified supervisor of Clinical Pastoral Education. In May 2011, Julie was awarded the Doctor of Divinity degree upon the 25th anniversary of her ordination.

BAMBI BULLARD



Bambi Bullard joined the Marine Corps with the goal of obtaining and using the Montgomery GI Bill. During her 15 years of service, she was assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division at Camp Lejeune and was one of the first women to go through Military Police on-the-job training. She was transferred to Parris Island where she served as a Drill Instructor for recruits. She was a part of the last Woman Marine Companies that existed in the Marine Corps. After serving at the Pentagon for the Secretary of the Navy and completing several graduate degree programs, she moved back to South Carolina and began her new mission to advocate for women veterans' rights. Bambi joined the Grand Strand Women Veterans group, where she served as the Commander. She currently raises awareness for women veterans through her role as a South Carolina Department of Veterans Affairs Pathfinder and as Regent of the Carolina Gold Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Murrells Inlet, SC. She is an active member of the American Legion, Rolling Thunder and POW/MIA organizations.



ASHLEY BROKOP



Air Force combat veteran, wife, and mother of three, Ashley Brokop, served as a breaking news, military alert, and aerial combat photographer over her eight-year career. Her byline includes photos from Saddam Hussein's trial, gritty Iraq combat imagery, dynamic photos of the Pakistan earthquake and Hurricane Katrina rescue efforts, and other key world events. After Ashley and her fellow Air Force husband, Bill, welcomed their son, Wesley, into the world, managing a dual-military family with long hours, temporary duties and overseas deployments became a strain. Ashley made the difficult decision to separate from service, allowing her to be home for her growing family. In the years following service, Ashley's identity became more synonymous with being a wife and mother, and less with being a military veteran. She started a small photography business, gave birth to two daughters, Betsy and Abby, and home schooled their three children. She currently resides in Indian Land, SC, with her now-retired husband, Bill, and two daughters. Her son Wesley has just left home for Air Force basic training.



TONYA SAVICE



Tonya Savice is an Air Force Veteran who served from 1981-1992. Throughout her career, she struggled with anxiety, chronic pain, military sexual trauma (MST), post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and survived multiple suicide attempts. After her discharge, she sought much-needed healthcare and realized there was a gap for both female veterans and women of color. She then became an advocate for herself and got involved with art as a form of healing. Finding success on her journey, she then sought to make it a more realistic therapeutic outlet for others like her. Today, Tonya is the Director of Advocacy of The Veterans Art Project (VETART) which supports veterans, active duty, spouses, dependents, and their caregivers through community-based arts.

SHANON DUFFY



Shanon Duffy always looked up to her older brother, Sergeant Shane Duffy, who served as an Army infantryman. After he was killed in action while deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom in June 2008, Shanon attended college for a time, only to drop out and enlist in the Air Force as a medic in 2011. Even though her dad was a Navy veteran and her brother an Army soldier, Shanon chose the Air Force because it was the only branch her brother wanted her to join. Through her work as a medic, Shanon found solace caring for service members and saving them from the same fate as her brother. She discovered a sense of peace and understanding through her service and a better understanding of why her brother volunteered to go on the mission that would ultimately end his life.



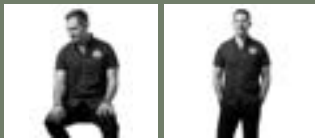
JOSEPH LAPOINTE



Joseph Guy LaPointe III is the son of posthumous Medal of Honor recipient, Joseph Guy LaPoint, Jr. Joe was just five months old when his father, an Army medic, was killed in action during the Vietnam War. He remained unaware of his father's service, until his early teens when his Dayton, OH, community asked him to take part in commemorative Memorial Day services. To better understand his father's sacrifice, Joe enlisted in the Army in 1986 and served as a missileer. In doing so, Joe learned the depth of camaraderie that led his father to volunteer for the mission that would ultimately end his life.



NATHANIEL LEE



Active-duty Space Force Major Nathaniel Lee is the Gold Star son of Army Captain Donnie Lee. Nathaniel was seven years old when his father was killed in an aviation accident in 1997. Shortly after his death, Nathaniel's mother moved his brother and him from Texas, where they had been stationed, to California where his mother was from, losing their connection to the military community they had known and loved. It was during that time that Nathaniel's mom found the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS); and in 1999, his mom, brother and he flew to Washington, D.C. for the TAPS National Military Survivor Seminar and Good Grief Camp. It was there, Nathaniel felt like he could truly honor his dad's legacy and tell his story. Today, Nathaniel gives back to TAPS by serving as a Legacy Mentor and Group Leader in the TAPS Good Grief Camp.

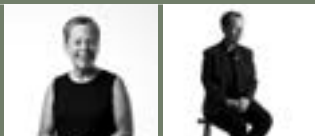
JAMES BOND



Marine Corps veteran James Bond is the first openly gay Secretary to serve in Department of Veterans Affairs history. He was appointed by Governor Tony Evers to serve as Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs on January 9, 2023. He has over three decades of service – service to his country, the State of Wisconsin, and to fellow veterans. James served on active duty in the United States Marine Corps from 1983–1988, with assignments at home and abroad. After receiving an Honorable Discharge from the Marine Corps, James returned to Wisconsin, enrolled at UW-Madison, attained his Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees, and for the past three decades served in several professional and executive leadership positions in service to the State of Wisconsin.



TAMMY SMITH



Tammy Smith is a retired Army Major General. At the conclusion of her 35-year career, she was serving at the Pentagon as the Military Advisor to the Assistant Secretary of the Army. She was responsible for developing innovative policy and providing oversight for the Army Quality of Life portfolio. Upon her promotion to Brigadier General in 2012, mere months after the repeal of Don't Ask/Don't Tell (DADT), then Brigadier General Smith gained unexpected visibility as the US military's first openly LGBT General/Flag officer. Rather than downplaying the significance of this unanticipated status, Tammy leveraged her role by promoting inclusion and diversity in the Army and Department of Defense, contributing to a culture of acceptance and trust in a post-DADT military. She demonstrated that military identity remains the foremost identity of a soldier while also acknowledging the intersectionality of other personal identities.



JASON VERO



Air Force Academy graduate and helicopter rescue pilot, Jason Vero, currently serves in the Air Force as an UN-1N Huey aviator. As a trans male serving openly after the repeal of “Don't Ask, Don't Tell,” Jason has witnessed many changes throughout the Department of Defense. After experiencing command failures and discrimination from his peers, he has harnessed his negative experiences toward more positive outcomes by advocating for the LGBTQ+ community. He provides thoughtful counsel to military leadership, education for his peers, and support for other trans service members on active duty.

Featured Veterans | Episode 6



ELBA BARR



First generation Cuban American, Elba Barr, grew up on a dairy farm in South Burlington, VT. Upon graduation from high school, Elba joined the Army as an Intelligence Analyst. While in service, she traveled to 28 countries while deployed as a senior analyst specializing in terrorism. In support of the Global War on Terror, Elba was stationed at the infamous Karshi-Khanabad (K2) Base in Uzbekistan, where she was exposed to hazardous chemicals such as tetrachloroethylene, cyanide and depleted uranium. Elba developed cancer – not once, but eight times. The mother of two underwent multiple surgeries and treatments including a hysterectomy and double mastectomy. She was key in the development and passing of the PACT Act and today advocates and advises fellow veterans of their rights. She mentors veterans peer-to-peer from her home in Colorado Springs.



RON CHERRY



Army veteran Ron Cherry currently serves as a Veterans of Foreign War (VFW) supervisor in the National Veterans Service (NVS) office in Kansas City, MO, where he oversees a team committed to assisting veterans as well as their spouses and dependents. Ron spent 12 years in the Army serving in personnel and since leaving service, has spent the subsequent years giving back to his fellow veterans by filing and appealing their disability claims with the Department of Veterans Affairs.



BOBBY TYNER

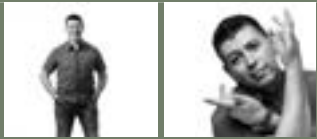


North Carolina native Bobby Tyner dropped out of high school to join the Army in 1965 because he believed his country needed him. He trained as a demolitionist and deployed in support of the Vietnam War to clear Viet Cong tunnels and set anti-personnel mines. He redeployed home and separated from the service in 1967. He floundered as a civilian, was married and divorced several times and struggled with Post Traumatic Stress. He finally met and married a partner who encouraged him to seek mental health support. At the same time, his declining physical health forced him to seek out medical testing through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). It was determined that he developed illnesses linked to Agent Orange exposure. While he battled several health-related issues, Bobby found himself supporting and guiding fellow Vietnam Veterans to the VA and joining the board of the Orange Heart Medal Foundation.

ROMAN BACA



Román Baca is a classically trained ballet dancer and choreographer, who enlisted in the Marine Corps in 2001, serving as a machine-gunner and fire-team leader in Fallujah, Iraq during the Iraq War. After leaving service, Roman returned to dance and co-founded Exit12 Dance Company, which tells veterans' stories choreographically, to increase cross-cultural understanding and heal divisions. He has choreographed and championed dance works that explore the military veteran experience and the impact of war on civilians and families. He also leads workshops and lectures at schools, universities, organizations, and veteran's centers to inspire critical conversations about war through the power of dance.



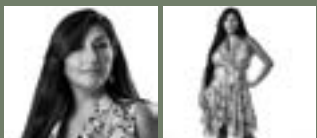
TREVOR MEYER



CEO and Co-Founder of Warrior Beat and Former US Navy Corpsman Trevor Meyer is a nationally recognized Drum Circle Facilitator, Motivational Speaker and Educator. He developed the Warrior Beat Method of Drum Circle Facilitation, which combines drumming and mindfulness meditation. Trevor has drummed with thousands of veterans across the United States since Warrior Beat's creation in 2016. Trevor realized his passion for playing drums at the age of 5. In 1997 Trevor enlisted as a Hospital Corpsman in the US Navy. He was then sent to Field Medical Service School where he was trained in combat medicine by the United States Marine Corps. He then served a two-year tour overseas as part of the forward deployed Pacific Fleet. Trevor has combined his passion for drumming and military experience to create a movement that will help alleviate suffering and enrich the lives of his fellow veterans.



MARIA SALAZAR



Maria "Mia" Salazar was born in Peru in 1980. In 1992, her family relocated to the United States, where they settled in Bridgewater NJ. After high school, Maria earned an Associates of Paralegal Studies. Following the attacks on 9/11, she enlisted in the United States Marine Corps where she served in the motor pool as a logistics specialist. After deploying for eight months in support of Operation Iraqi freedom, Maria was honorably discharged, having served nine years. Upon entering the civilian sector, Salazar became a fitness and dance instructor, based mostly in central NJ. She pursued a BS of Art Therapy with a focus in Ceramics and Art History and eventually founded Claymore Vets.

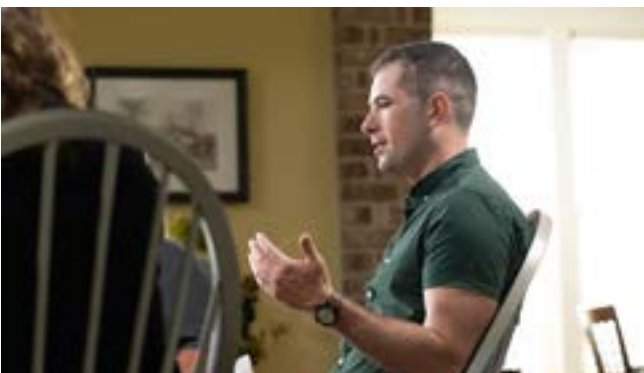

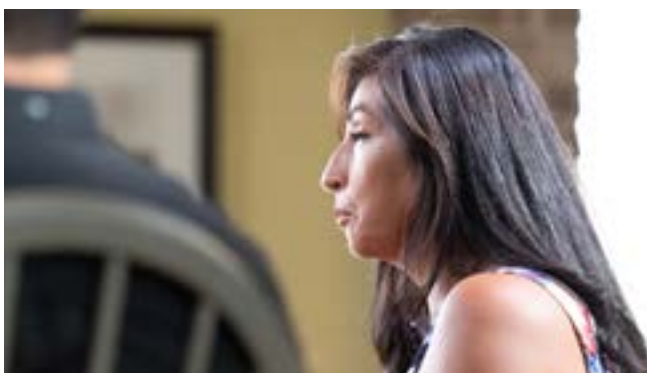
