
Using the 2020 Census in Teaching and Learning

Why it Matters







You count! Every South Carolinian counted in the 2020 Census is estimated to bring \$2900 of federal resources to our state each year!





That's approximately \$29,000 over ten years!

The Challenge

- The Census determines the amount of federal money that South Carolina receives. This helps fund education, free lunches, early childhood programs, roads, bridges, parks, and other things that make communities across our state better.
- South Carolina's population is estimated to have grown by 12% from the last Census. If everyone isn't counted, South Carolina will lose out.
- Children are traditionally one of the most under-counted groups.



The Solution: Parent and Educator Heroes


By working with the Lieutenant Governor's office and experienced educators, I've created resources that you can use with your students and that families can use at home. These include:

- Activities to celebrate being counted in the 2020 Census and to use it as a learning opportunity.
- Lesson Plans with curriculum tie-ins to art, ELA, civics, geography, history, mathematics, and social studies. Lesson plans also include citations to South Carolina standards.
- Two videos highlighting the importance of the 2020 Census to South Carolina

Activities



Activity: Create a Census Time Capsule:

- You can use a shoe box, lunch box or any other container
- Put in items that represent the everyday life in the past year of your family or class. Invite everyone who's counted in the Census to contribute at least one item.
- -Post a "Do Not Open Until 2030 Census" sign on your Time Capsule



Activity: Get Creative with Original Artwork

- Let your friends and neighbors know that everyone in your household has been counted and encourage them to get counted too! You can create an original piece of artwork and display it on your driveway, sidewalk, front door, window, or social media channels.
- You can use chalk, markers, pens, pencils or digital media. You can even create your own photo collage.



Activity: Census Celebration Night

On the day that you fill out the Census, create a family celebration dinner featuring foods for which South Carolina is known such as pimento cheese, barbeque, shrimp and grits, and peach cobbler



Activity: Census Celebration Outing

On the day that you fill out the Census, if it's safe for you to go out, visit a South Carolina park or library. Your being counted helps make these community resources possible.



Activity: Coloring Page/Picture Frame

Activity: Display your Badges!


- Share the "Count Me In" badge with friends and neighbors. Print out one badge for each person in the household to make sure everyone is counted.

Lesson Plans



Lesson Plan # 1: What is the Census

- Explore the history and importance of the Census
- Review the 2020 Census form
- Examine, analyze, and present mathematically Census data and population trends for South Carolina



Lesson Plan # 2: The 2020 Census: Everyone Counts

- Introduce students to the 2020 Census process and use Census resources to emphasize that every person (even babies and children) should be counted
- Brainstorm all the different places people live (including military bases, nursing homes, college dorms, campers, RV's, hotels, hospitals, shelters, group homes, foster homes, jail, cars, and boats) and discuss why they might be missed in the Census.
- Explore literature in which a main character is not living with their parents and invite students to write a letter to that character to encourage them to be counted in the 2020 Census



Lesson Plan # 3: The Census and Why it Matters

- Explore the many ways Census data is used to help fund programs that make our state better and to determine our representation in Congress.
- Make a list of things students use or places they
 visit in their community that are affected by the
 2020 Census. Write a letter to a fictional friend
 who lives in another country explaining why
 South Carolina will be better for all if everyone
 is counted.
- Fill out a U.S. map to record the number of Representatives in the House of Representatives for each state.
- Analyze a variety of Census videos, determine their target audience, summarize their message, evaluate their effectiveness and prepare your own Census ad materials.

Lesson Plan # 4: The Census: What Can I Do?

- Engage the creative talents of students to help make sure that every person in South Carolina is counted.
- Explore the South Carolina 2020 Census response rate by county and ask students to track the response on a map of South Carolina as that response rate changes over time. How is their county doing? Which county is winning?
- Ask students to write a one-page story set in a fictional town where no one filled out the 2020 Census. How are things different?
- Invite students to brainstorm and implement ways to help spread the word among their friends and family about the importance of everyone being counted in the 2020 Census.
